

Musculoskeletal Oncology Clinic Opens

Efficiencies in 'one stop' system benefit patients, educational research

The oncology faculty at the MACC Fund Research Center, led by Cancer Center Director Dr. Bruce Camitta and Oncology subdivision head Dr. Michael Kelly, recently unveiled the facility's newest service, which focuses on patients with primary bone tumors and other extremity tumors.

The Musculoskeletal Oncology Clinic opened its doors in mid-April. Located in the General Oncology Clinic, it is one of only a handful such clinics nationally, the nearest one being in Cleveland.

Staff members behind this project are orthopedic-oncology surgeons Drs. David King and Don Hackbarth; clinical oncologist Dr. Anne Warrick; Nurse practitioners Amy Newman and Susie Burke; physician assistants Heather Billington and Lori Hollingsworth-Burds; nurse-coordinator Renee Harteau; occupational therapist Colleen Baughn; physical therapist Diane Feldt; and Dr. Meg Browning, medical director of the clinic and a primary clinical oncologist.

"We felt there were a number of inefficiencies in the current system, the worst of which affected the patients," said Dr. Browning, whose role will be both on the clinical side as well as research. "We're very excited about this project. By being more streamlined, we're going to be more efficient both cost-wise and time-wise. We really want to put that time back into education and make sure we are maintaining the highest level of knowledge in a very specialized piece of an already specialized field."

Prior to the clinic opening, patients oftentimes had to go back and forth to different hospitals to receive treatment. The new clinic will minimize the shuffling around. For example, a patient might have to see orthopedic oncology surgeons Dr. King or Dr. Hackbarth at Froedert Hospital and then be sent over to Children's Hospital of Wisconsin to see the oncologist. Patients may need other services such as physical therapy, nutrition, social work, psychological services, educational services and so on.

"Now we're consolidated," Dr. Browning said.

This is welcome news to current patients as

well as the dozen or so new bone tumor patients who are diagnosed annually. Add the fact that 40-45% of patients with primary bone tumors relapse – despite the best available therapy – clearly better options for treatment and care were needed.

"Rather than have patients go 'here and there' to get their services, it is now easier and more

convenient for the patient. More importantly, we felt that by collecting everyone all in one space we would all hear what every other member of the team was saying all at once.

"This gives everyone the opportunity to say 'that plan' doesn't fit in the time available, or their schooling interferes with 'this plan' for chemotherapy," Dr. Browning added. Or 'that plan' for their crutch use is not what the surgeons think is appropriate. Anything that could potentially cause conflict in what patients are asked to do is now centralized. We're all going to make the plan together at the same time and in the same place."

Patients and families should be more at ease knowing they are not receiving conflicting information. Also, the clinic is an easily identifiable facility which is a benefit for referring providers.

"It's a place where one can easily and conveniently receive all the services they need," Dr. Browning said.

The Musculoskeletal Oncology Clinic became a reality thanks to the support of the MACC Fund.

"It's hard to miss the MACC Fund when it comes to looking at oncology or research," said Dr. Browning, who started her Residency here in 1995 at the Medical College of Wisconsin. Seeking "real world" experience, Dr. Browning practiced on a Navajo reservation for a few years before returning to Milwaukee to do her Hematology and Oncology Fellowship in 2000.

"I initially didn't want to come back to Milwaukee only because I didn't think it was a great to do all my training in one place," she said. "But the MACC Fund attracts a lot of faculty and researchers here for various reasons. That draws people in, and allows new perspectives. I also think it attracts patients and their families. MACC Fund supported translational research is a big part of what keeps me here today."

The new clinic will allow Dr. Browning and fellow staff to step up its research as well as beef up the availability and access to that research.

"We'll be big enough to try out new strategies," Dr. Browning predicted. "Hopefully we'll be able to protect patients from certain side effects. We have a research project where we're trying to do pre-clinical work for tumor vaccines.

"We also want to look at specific bone issues for kids not allowed to walk for a several months or a year. One of the things that happens is they starting losing bone density. So we want to look at that."

The clinic is also going to make it much easier to work with other centers in the region like Chicago and Madison.

"We're now better able to reach out and help more patients take advantage of all the options that will improve their care and treatment."



Dear MACC Fund Supporter:

A cancer mom from Nebraska reminded me of something Mark Twain said years ago, "there are three kinds of lies: lies, damn lies and statistics." That seems to be true given what we've been hearing from legislators who are determined to cut the federal budget to the NCI from the levels that are needed.

At a time when science is making breakthroughs in understanding the causes of cancer, accelerating progress in preventing it, improving early detection and diagnosis, and developing more effective and less toxic treatment, the budget of the primary federal agency that funds cancer research and trials the National Cancer Institute - (NCI) has been significantly cut from the level it has requested every year since 1997. In 2007 the shortfall is more than \$1 billion. Here's the problem with that - NCI funding has been largely responsible for many of the advances in understanding cancer and the improvement in survival rates that have occurred in the last 25 years.

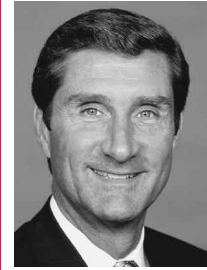
Funding levels are incredibly inadequate considering the prevalence of cancer in our lives. Budget cuts are limiting NCI funding to less than one-tenth of the research proposals it receives. There's just not enough money to fund them. Sadly, the only way that advances in cancer treatment will be made is through research, and the more lines of research that are being followed, the more likely it is that breakthroughs will be made. Simply put, everything we know about saving the lives of kids with cancer has come from research.

The claim that private funding will step in to fill the gap is just plain wrong. While private funding certainly helps, there's just too much money needed to fund the research that needs to be done. And expecting the drug companies to pick up the slack isn't likely either. The problem is that bringing a new drug to the market is extremely expensive, it's roughly a billion dollars. Add to that the idea that drug companies show little interest in developing drugs that can't be patented or cannot get through the additional layers of regulatory protection for treatment of our kids.

There's been a reduction in funding the Children's Oncology Group (COG) which combines resources in order to conduct clinical trials of new treatments. This allows kids with cancer to stay close to home for their treatment and care. Nine out of 10 kids with cancer are treated at 200 COG member institutions. These include Children's Hospital of Wisconsin which utilizes treatment protocols resulting in part from MACC Fund supported research at the Midwest Children's Cancer Center of the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee as well as the Children's Hospital at the University of Wisconsin in Madison. The rapid sharing of information through the Children's Oncology Group has led to phenomenal improvements in childhood cancer survival rates, increasing them from 10 percent to 80 percent overall. Despite the documented success of these groups, new clinical trials have been postponed or cancelled. Access to them has been seriously reduced and families are either forced to travel to an institution offering a trial or to forgo getting what could be the best possible treatment for their child.

That's the kind of stuff that gets lost in all the statistics. Without some sort of encouragement from private funding, this sad news can be devastating to these kids and their families. It's the very thing that the MACC Fund continues to provide - hope for the future. The fight goes on for the sake of those affected by childhood cancers and related blood disorders and for those at risk for it. They're relying on us not to give it up. There are many opportunities to join us in fighting these diseases over the next few months, we'll hope to see you along the way. The TREK 100 with Lance Armstrong



The TREK 100 is the largest fund-raising event in the 30-year history of the MACC Fund. Cyclists will once again "ride for hope" on Saturday, June 2, in the 18th Annual TREK 100. Lance Armstrong is scheduled to be at the start of the TREK 100's longest rides at 7:30 a.m., the TREK 100 Century 100-mile ride and the "Metric Century" 62-mile ride to help make the ride even more exciting. Lance's battle with cancer, his triumph over it, and his standard-bearing persona for cancer research is legendary and exemplary.

TREK 100 riders will raise funds for research for children with cancer and related blood disorders by biking the 100-mile, 100-kilometer (62-mile), the 32-mile, or the 14-mile ride. Over \$6 million has been contributed from the TREK 100 since 1990. Last year's TREK 100 netted a record \$750,000 thanks to the efforts of more than 2,400 cyclists and generous Century Club auction bidders. With the help of Lance and others, 2007 can produce an even bigger, record-breaking gift of hope.

The MACC Fund is excited that Lance Armstrong is planning to be part of the TREK 100 which has become an important symbol of hope. The MACC Fund is also indebted to Trek Bicycle Corporation, the nation's leading manufacturer of quality bicycles, for its incredible commitment to

children. Trek also produced the bikes which Lance Armstrong rode to his Tour De France victories.

The TREK 100 has also been voted "one of the best rides in the country" by *Bicycling Magazine*. The ride will once again begin and end at Waukesha County Technical College (WCTC) in Pewaukee which has embraced the TREK 100 and the MACC Fund for years. The entry fee is \$35 per rider by the May 18 deadline, plus pledge amounts equal to \$1 per mile ridden. The ride will be limited to the first 3,500 riders who register, regardless of the deadline. Participants receive a commemorative, 100-percent heavy cotton T-shirt, breakfast, lunch and rest stops with nutritious refreshments served by enthusiastic volunteers. The best ride support around from the Trek Wrench Force as well as local Trek dealers will be on hand to assist riders.

A post-ride celebration sponsored by Silver Spur and Delafield Brewery along with great music and a relaxing massage, tops off a terrific day of cycling and giving hope to kids with cancer.

Great Trek merchandise is offered as an incentive for those who "go the extra mile" to raise pledges to help a child with cancer. Items include TREK 100 socks, floor pumps, bags, headlights, tool packs, trainers, repair stands and a wide variety of Trek bikes.

The Trek 100 Century Club offers members who raise \$1,000 by May 11 some added benefits, including: a cocktail reception with Lance Armstrong with live music; custom Century Club clothing including a commemorative jersey; limited edition rider socks from The Sock Guy; an amazing silent auction; a domestic Trek Travel Trip for two, a Trek "Lime" Bike; and much more.

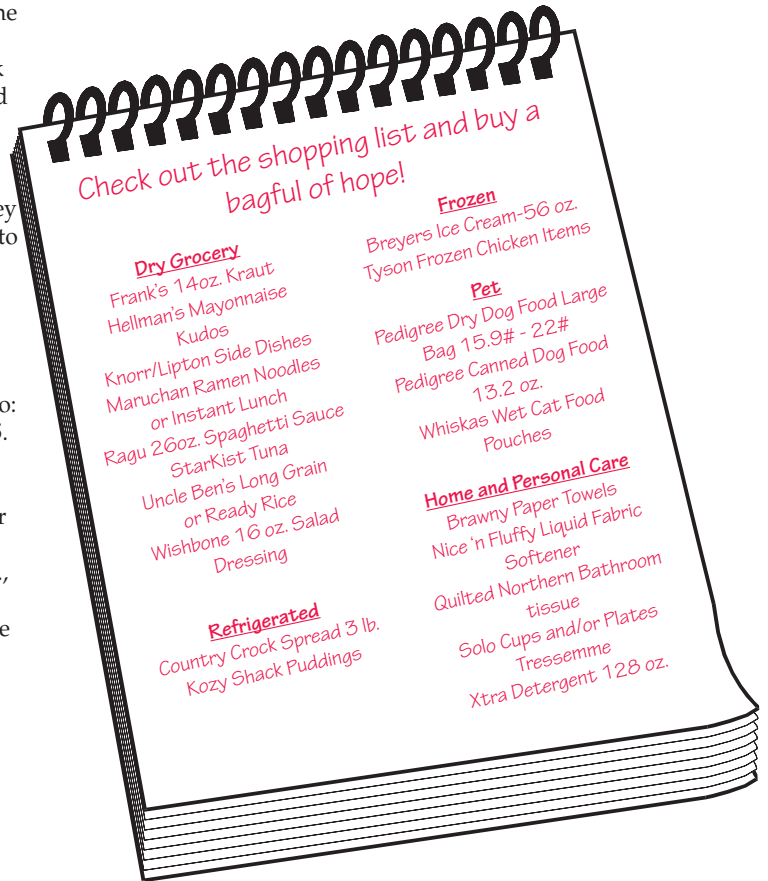

MACC Fund also supports research at the UW Cancer Center

The MACC Fund has supported research at the University of Wisconsin's Paul P. Carbone Comprehensive Cancer Center since 1984. Recently, Bill Steinberg, Chairman of the MACC Fund's Board of Directors, along with MACC Fund Board Treasurer Jan Lennon, presented a check for \$330,000 to Paul Sondel, M.D., Ph.D., Division Head of Pediatric Hematology and Oncology. This is the largest annual contribution by the MACC Fund to support seven of the Center's researchers. The MACC Fund has contributed nearly \$2.4 million to the University's Pediatric Oncology research efforts in the past 23 years. Last year, the MACC Fund's Board made an additional \$3.5 million multi-year commitment to support research in the MACC Fund Pediatric Cancer Research Wing which is under construction in the University's Interdisciplinary Research Center.

The UW grants were recommended for funding by the MACC Fund's Scientific Review Board. This Board provides independent oversight by three nationally renowned scientists who are enlisted to review the research the MACC Fund supports. Its primary beneficiary is the Midwest Children's Cancer Center of the Medical College of Wisconsin. The other beneficiary is the University of Wisconsin's Paul P. Carbone Comprehensive Cancer Center.

Dr. John Maris of Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and University of Pennsylvania Medical School chairs the review board. He is regarded as the world's leading expert on neuroblastoma, a form of pediatric cancer. The other members are Dr. Susan Blaney of Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital, and Dr. Crystal Mackall, Interim Director of Pediatric Oncology/Hematology at the National Cancer Institute of the National Institute of Health.

"Williamson is a cancer survivor. Diagnosed with leukemia at age 8, he is now considered cancer-free.

"It's incredible that our golf coaches and golfers did this," he said. "It really makes me proud. I've been part of the MACC Fund since I was diagnosed. I understand what that money will do."

MACC Fund treasurer and board member Dave Morris thanked the golfers and reminded them that in their lifetimes they may hear that overall cure rates for cancer are 100%. He noted that "You may not remember your score today, but you will remember that you were part of that."

Thanks to the golfers and coaches, the generous donors and hole sponsors, the Arrowhead parents and volunteers, coach Tom Tallmadge and Erin Hills' owner Bob Lang. It was a great day of golf with life lessons learned as well as invaluable golf's lessons.
