

Drs. Sondel-Margolis cancer research connection goes way back

MACC Fund serves as catalyst to 'outstanding' Madison-Milwaukee partnership

They say timing is everything.

That was certainly the case for Ben (fictitious name), who was diagnosed with aplastic anemia as a young child three decades ago. He along with far too many others had a disease and circumstance that were virtually incurable at that time. While tragic, he didn't survive, Ben's legacy lives on and continues to have a positive and profound effect on two very special pediatric hematologists-oncologists... as well as the future of childhood cancer research.

At the time – 1987 -- Dr. Paul Sondel, who now heads up the University of Wisconsin's Pediatric Oncology effort at the Carbone Cancer Center in Madison, had just been promoted to Professor at UW-Madison. Dr. David Margolis, Professor, Program Director, Bone Marrow Transplant at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and Interim Section Chief of the MACC Fund Research Center in Milwaukee, was a medical student at UW.

"I remember like it was yesterday, Paul's patient Ben was my first aplastic anemia patient," said Dr. Margolis, admitting he didn't know a thing about aplastic anemia or bone marrow transplants for that matter. "But the relationship Paul had with Ben and that I developed with Ben as a medical student was really special."

That point in time is only a snapshot glimpse of what went on back then, according to Dr. Margolis. There is a full length picture to this story.

"I couldn't have predicted it at the time, but look at what I am doing now. I'm still working with Paul. And I'm still working with that generation of mentors that came before Paul -- Drs. Bruce Camitta and Jim Casper. It goes back to someone like Paul showing me the value of the 'doctorpatient' relationship and the irony 'or luck' of falling into a residency and working with great guys like Camitta and Casper." Dr. Sondel remembers very well that Ben, whom he had known since he was a baby, didn't have a match for a bone marrow transplant. "At the time unrelated bone marrow transplants were still in the experimental phase. They were rarely considered because many of the patients were experiencing catastrophic problems from severe graft vs. host disease. The clinical research to help these be successful hadn't been done yet.

"So every time I saw Ben I kept asking myself, should we go ahead and recommend the unrelated bone marrow transplant? It's his one chance at a cure. But the potential side effects could be so horrific."

Ben did OK for awhile – with transfusions, antibiotics and other supportive means – anything to keep him going, to buy some time and let him get better.

"It didn't happen," Dr. Sondel recalls. "In the process of providing supportive care and trying to get him to some more effective new research that hadn't yet been discovered, sadly Ben died from complications of his disease."

Progress and Hope

Welcome to the high stakes of childhood cancer and blood disorders where there are winners and there are losers. But even in the excruciating loss of a child there can be progress and hope, based on the knowledge learned, the determination to refine the



Dear MACC Fund Supporter:

A year ago in this space I told you what an honor it was to hold the position of Chairman of the Board of Directors of the MACC Fund. The Roundtable featured a distinguished panel whom the MACC Fund is proud to support, namely Drs. Margolis, Kelly and Medin. Drs. Margolis and Kelly are seasoned MACC Fund veterans while Dr. Medin joined us from Toronto in January as the long-awaited MACC Fund Professor. (You can read more about the Roundtable on page 14.) It was readily apparent that great progress has been made from the early days. An overall childhood cancer cure rate of 80 percent is one sign, yet that elusive 20 percent and the fact that kids still relapse and have late effect issues serves as an exclamation point of how much more needs to be done. Regardless of those obstacles, the engaging panelists made it clear that the \$56 million which the MACC Fund has contributed to research since 1976 is truly making a difference in Wisconsin and far beyond.

treatment process and hopefully do things better for the next child and the next generation of childhood cancer patients.

"In many ways it's very personal," Dr. Sondel said. "For David to have that experience as a student on the oncology-hematology ward influenced his career to focus on aplastic anemia. He is now recognized as a clinical thought-leader in the world of pediatric aplastic anemia bone marrow transplantation. His work has been critical in enabling centers world-wide to now be able to do successful transplants that weren't possible before. If only his clinical research could have been at that level when Ben needed it in 1987 we might have been able to provide Ben a better chance."

Moving forward, working collaboratively, positively impacting the lives of children with cancer.

Such is the mantra of this dual team of doctors and their team of researchers who fight the battle. Supplying ammunition and the glue to keep all of this together for the past 40 years has been the MACC Fund.

"The MACC Fund has consistently supported this research and allowed us to move ahead and be in a different place than we were before," said Dr. Sondel. "One of the most awesome responsibilities and honor that anyone of us will ever have is the trust that these families put in our hands when they allow us the privilege of trying to help their children make the best of it. Support from The MACC Fund enables us to provide hope, when it hadn't been there before."

Dr. Margolis concurs, adding "The reason we are continuing both lab and clinical research is that until we get to the 100% quality of life survival rate, there are questions that need to be answered. The MACC Fund provides the resources for us to answer those questions. There is a lot of passion that goes along with that."

Milwaukee-Madison connection

Both doctors and their respective departments/teams in Milwaukee and Madison have relationships that go back a long ways.

"The bottom line is we share the same fight together," said Dr. Margolis. "While we care about our areas of expertise, at the end of the day we're here to provide 'hope through research' for children with cancer and blood disorders."

Career paths start in North Shore

The career paths taken by the two doctors have interesting parallels, considering they both grew up in Milwaukee's North Shore – Dr. Sondel a graduate of Nicolet High School in Glendale (class of 1968); and Dr. Margolis a generation later as an alum at Whitefish Bay (class of 1981).

Dr. Sondel attended UW-Madison as an undergraduate. Dr. Margolis went to Indiana University-Bloomington. Dr. Sondel went on to Harvard for medical school while Dr. Margolis attended UW-Madison, which is where their two careers intersected. They later settled in their home state – Dr. Sondel in Madison and Dr. Margolis in Milwaukee.

Dr. Sondel was "one of those lucky guys" who knew he wanted to be a doctor at 8 years old.

In third grade his parents bought him an anatomy book and he was fascinated by it. In high school he had family friends who were physicians and from 10th grade on he'd go on rounds with Drs. Burton Waisbren and Walter Shapiro.

"They were great examples and I knew I wanted to go into medicine," Dr. Sondel said. "At UW I was fascinated with what I was learning in my genetics class and I decided my sophomore year (of college) to start knocking on doors of human genetic researchers to find a part-time lab job.

"And talk about luck, the third door I knocked on was Dr. Fritz Bach's. After grilling me he said ' I'll take you.' Dr. Bach was the first in the world to do a successful bone marrow transplant.

I really saw some potential in this direction of research and I wanted to stick with it."

Dr. Sondel went on to Harvard Medical School, which was a terrific experience for him. Even so, "in order to stay connected to the cutting edge research in Dr. Bach's lab, I took a leave of absence from medical school and came back to Wisconsin to complete my PhD. "

Dr. Sondel, then returned to Boston, to complete medical school, where he thought he might also do his residency. But when he learned his wife, Sherie (a Whitefish Bay graduate), was pregnant the couple knew they wanted to be near family, and they returned to Madison. The couple now have four grown children, three children 'in-law', and four grandchildren.

"They are the light of our lives", says Dr. Sondel. He looks forward to riding in the MACC Fund's Trek-100 each June, with Sherie, on their tandem, and with their children when they can also join in.

"I always knew if there was a way for me to get back to Madison someday I would. While a resident in Madison, I set up a 3month 'mini-fellowship,' travelling daily by Badger bus to Milwaukee, to enable me to learn from Drs. Bruce Camitta and Jim Casper. They really showed me what comprehensive-compassionate care is all about."

He joined the faculty at UW in 1980 in the Department of Pediatrics, Human Oncology and Genetics which he credits "to being lucky and knowing people who look out for you, take the time to show things that are new and exciting, and seeing ways to get you involved."

He was promoted to professor in 1987 and became leader of the UW Carbone Cancer Center's Program in Immunology in 1990, when he also became Head of the Division of Pediatric Hematology and Oncology.

For Dr. Margolis his career choice was either pre-med or pre-law.

"I didn't know what I was going to do," Dr. Margolis said. "Many of my dad's friends were doctors and lawyers and they were all going through a mid-life crisis. My dad was a lawyer and he didn't want me to go into law...so I chose medicine. Interestingly, a number of those children of doctors are successful lawyers now!

"And for the record it's true my dad said I wasn't smart enough to go to law school," Dr. Margolis jokes. He kiddingly adds that being a surgeon was not an option..."not with these hands. There's no insurance company that could afford that."

It was either take care of kids or take care of adults. He had been a camp counselor at Camp JCC and always enjoyed working with kids. It made sense to focus on children.

The computer randomly placed Dr. Margolis in Milwaukee for his residency, even though he and his wife, Jody, wanted to be in Chicago. They now reside in Mequon and have two children – Rachel works in human resources at MCW and Melissa is a recent Indiana University graduate. Both his parents still live in Whitefish Bay (and are loyal Milwaukee Bucks season ticketholders, but it's their son who goes to most of the games).

"As it turns out it's probably the best thing that ever happened to me. I got to work with Dr. Jim Casper. You have to love what you do. I love the science, the thinking behind immunology, and the bed side hand holding.

"That's the thing about cancer and blood disorders; we do assume much of the general pediatrician's role – right or wrong – and we develop these strong relationships. You may not always remember the name but you always remember the face. You get invited to weddings, graduations, Bar Mitvzahs... and unfortunately you go to more than your fair share of funerals."

Dr. Margolis recalls getting thrown "kicking and screaming" into Dr. Jack Gorski's Immunology Lab. "I didn't want to go, but I ended up spending the next seven to eight years working in the immunology lab and studying basic immunology development as well as the basic immunology of graft vs. leukemia and graft vs. host disease in patients. What it really boils down to is being in the right place at the right time and making sure you do something you love and that interests you."

Surrounding oneself with great people also helps.

"I'm also trying to influence first and second-year medical students, like I learned from Paul Sondel. I love teaching these students. I'm very proud and honored when a student asks if they 'can shadow you'...and then they land in the Pediatric Residency Program."

Both doctors are proud of the work they and their colleagues have been able to accomplish, with the support of the MACC Fund, in Madison and Milwaukee.

"The fact that clinical research has made as much progress as it has, given how little we really understand about cancer, is amazing." Dr. Sondel said. "That in itself is a testament to the research process, and proves that we have to be humble. No matter how good your idea is, if it's not working the way you want it to, you have to say there's something about this you don't understand. You have to go back and do it differently and then continue to push on."

Outstanding Investigator Award

The National Cancer Institute (NCI) is the world-wide driving force for biomedicalcancer research. Since joining the faculty in 1980, Dr. Sondel said it has now become much more difficult to get an NCI research grant funded. Back then about 25% of the grants submitted were funded. Now it's about 8%.

"There's less NCI money, it's much more expensive to do research, there are more researchers and overall more competition," said Dr. Sondel, noting grants need to go toward projects that take three to five years. "The reviewers want to make sure what you're asking for is going to work. Your research should be 30-50% completed before you apply for the grant. While this support is critical to progress, it might not promote the pursuit of more novel, yet untested concepts."

However, in the summer of 2014 the NCI reinstituted a program from the 1990s. It recognized that in order to pursue new projects that might take more time to develop, there needed to be some assurance of grant money for proven investigators. The NCI said it was going to issue roughly 50 grants in a format that hadn't been used in 20 years. It was called a R35 Grant and its title "Outstanding Investigator Award."

"They asked experienced researchers that had previously received past NCI grants what they hoped to accomplish over the next seven years that might make a real change or impact on cancer."

Dr. Sondel and his research team worked on the grant throughout the summer and fall of 2014.

The goals focused on:

- Immunotherapy, which activates a patient's own immune cells and has the potential to be an ideal cancer therapy;
- Being tumor-specific, ability to eradicate primary tumors and metastases, prevent recurrence and not have side effects;
- Identifying and refining combinations of immunotherapies to move this science forward towards better treatment.

Upon learning that he and his team had been selected one of the 50 recipients (and the only one in pediatric cancer) Dr. Sondel said (of the seven-year grant of \$6.4 million), "I was so pleased and excited that our team would now have this opportunity to further pursue our ideas and progress."

Dr. Margolis acknowledged his friend and colleague by saying: "Where this is going to lead we don't know. But Paul has the freedom for the next seven years to ask questions. He'll be able to spend less time doing grantsmanship and more time doing science."

Team effort

The two Pediatric Oncologists Hematologists enjoy teaming up with one another.

"We like working together...and we have to work together," Dr. Margolis said. "It's that banding together that allows questions to be asked locally, regionally, nationally and internationally. One of the reasons outcomes for pediatric cancer in the U.S. and Europe are so much better than for adult cancer is because pediatric oncologists have chosen to work together."

Some of the work Dr. Sondel is most excited about is combining two different kinds of immunotherapy together with radiation therapy. A world expert in this area is MACC Fund supported researcher Dr. Bryan Johnson in Milwaukee.

"Dr. Johnson had come to Madison on an every other year basis to talk with us about his research," Dr. Sondel said. "We not only learned from him but we also asked his advice on what we should be doing differently in some of our models. He's been very helpful. So instead of us reinventing the wheel when it comes to caring for children we all want to help each other and share information."

There are other collaborations with the two cancer research teams.

"We have a neurobiologist from Madison who wants to work with our group to understand brain side effects of leukemia therapy," Dr. Margolis said. "We're helping that team accrue patient samples and help answer their questions.

"When Dr. Jeff Medin (newly appointed MACC Fund Professor in the department of pediatrics at MCW) has a study open with immune cells and we need more patients we can partner with Madison to get things open there. That's one of the nice things about being an hour away. Plus we have very similar philosophies. We talk about 'open protocols' where we're making immune, infection-fighting cells to try and make transplants safer.

"That's where we all benefit from the MACC Fund's support of both programs. I think the intellectual capacity – basic science research, clinical trials organizations and translational research – is an area where we all can work together for the betterment of not just the children in Wisconsin, but anything that goes worldwide."

Dr. Sondel's years of study on neuroblastoma, for example – his team's first therapy experiment was done in the lab in 1987 -- has now helped lead to an FDA approved commercially available antibody used to help treat that disease. Even so, more progress is desperately needed to help children diagnosed with this disease, since too many are still dying. This is where the MACC Fund is instrumental.

MACC Fund's huge impact

Dr Margolis summarizes: "I think it's very fair to say to the MACC Fund community, you have made a huge impact on pediatric cancer research locally, regionally and nationally. The return on that investment includes the research by Dr. Sondel and his team, and the incredible infrastructure of clinical trials and basic science that The MACC Fund supports in Milwaukee and Madison."

There is continued effort in cross talk and collaboration between the MACC Fund supported teams in Milwaukee and Madison.

"We're all kind of jumping into the sandbox and playing beautifully together," Dr. Margolis said. "Everyone in the sandbox has the same goal -- getting rid of childhood cancer and allowing children with cancer and blood disorders to survive with a high quality of life.

"We're all playing a little differently – some are doing clinical trials, some clinical care, much of it is bench research, some work with mice, some are working with humans, some with cells. All of this put together, to me, occurs in the state of Wisconsin because of the MACC Fund.

"We in Milwaukee are very proud of Paul and his work. The MACC Fund is an incredible catalyst that supports great work at both centers."

Cure in the future?

The ultimate goal is and continues to be eradicating pediatric cancer.

"The problem with the future is nobody knows for sure what's going to happen," Dr. Sondel said. "But I've never in my career been as excited and optimistic about what we should be able to do in the next few years based on some dramatic changes.

"I think we're really translating science in a way we couldn't do 20 years ago based on a much greater understanding of what tools we have in our tool box. This includes not only standard treatments but also newer treatments that we think are kinder, smarter, gentler and more specific."

Dr. Sondel's dream is to someday soon be able to back off from radiation and chemotherapy to cure cancer in children without putting them at a great risk for a second cancer. "I don't think we're going to get rid of all pediatric cancer in five years," Dr. Sondel said. "I'm not sure we're going to get rid of all of it in 20 years. But when cancer does occur I think we're going to be much closer to being able to have effective treatments (kinder, gentler, more specific) for virtually all children with cancer."

"Knowledge is power," Dr. Margolis said. "The amount of knowledge starting from the Camitta-Casper era to where we are today comes from the MACC Fund."

The MACC Fund has supported research that helped improve the survival curve. "With our understanding of cancer biology, coupled with immunology, together we are at the start of the next rocket ship of improvement."

Dr. Margolis adds, "Because of our understanding of the immune system, understanding how each individual is different, how each individual metabolizes medicine, hopefully we're going to have many more targeted therapies."

There will probably always be a need for pediatric oncologists. Likewise there will also be a need for an organization like the MACC Fund.

"It's because of the MACC Fund that people in Wisconsin should be so proud of the pediatric oncology clinical care and the research connected to it, in both Milwaukee and Madison," Dr. Sondel said. "Milwaukee is clearly the bigger clinical program and both centers have reputations that are really outstanding.

"People should be aware of the impact that MACC Fund supported programs are having on the rest of the country and the treatment of children with cancer. Our ability to continue to do research -- in the case of my lab team (and several others in Milwaukee and Madison) – is because of the support from the MACC Fund. As much as we've been productive in my 36 years of running the lab in Madison there were some tough times when we didn't get NCI grants. It's because of the MACC Fund and its structure, which includes providing support to untested but promising new ideas and approaches, that we have been able to pilot new programs and continue this research."

Dr. Margolis recalls that during his days as a Fellow and a resident that the only way for a cancer patient with chronic myeloid leukemia (CML) to survive was with a bone marrow transplant. Because of the recent improvements in care (due to understanding of biology and other advances) better drugs are now available, so that bone marrow transplants are seldom needed anymore for CML.

"The concept of precision medicine – this is not just for Time Magazine -- is actually going to happen for all of us," said Dr. Margolis. "Cancer will probably become more of a chronic disease, until such time that we can prevent it. I still have the dream that my grandchildren can go to the doctor and get a cancer vaccine."

That would be sweet music to everyone's ears, especially to anyone affected by cancer...and people like Ben.


The 27th Annual TREK 100 *"Ride for Hope"*



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

Aaron Rodgers Continues to Back MACC



MACC Fund beneficiaries, the Medical College of Wisconsin and Children's Hospital of Wisconsin, hosted a Childhood Cancer Roundtable on April 29 to help

celebrate the 40th year of the MACC Fund. The first ever event was held in the hospital's auditorium before more than 100 people. Following welcoming remarks by Peggy Troy, CEO of Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and Dr. John Raymond, President and CEO of the Medical College of Wisconsin, Milwaukee County Executive Chris Abele, Lieutenant Governor Rebecca Kleefisch, State Representative Peter Barca and United States Senator Ron Johnson all extended congratulatory remarks on the MACC Fund's four decades of research support for pediatric cancer and blood disorders. MACC Fund Vice-Chair, Kevin Steiner, moderated a panel discussion with Mike Kelly, PhD, MD, Dave Margolis, MD, and Jeffrey A. Medin, PhD. 
Christopher Schraufnagel's limited years did not limit his ability to touch people far and near from his neighbors to Super Bowl Champions Donald Driver and Aaron Rodgers of the Green Bay Packers. His legacy continues to live on since all who met him could never forget him. He died in June, 2012, after a valiant 17-month battle with medulloblastoma - a form of childhood cancer that attacks the brain and spinal cord.

On July 8, his family and friends will return to the Waukesha Gun Club to honor the boy whose dream was to cure childhood cancer. "Christopher's Shoot" is sponsored by the Waukesha Gun Club which has been outstanding in its support. The day features something for every level of sporting clay and trap enthusiast. Last year's record breaking event raised \$131,000. Since its inception five years ago, Christopher's Shoot has raised nearly \$375,000. Family and friends have also helped live out his dream of a cure through *Team Christopher* which rides in the TREK 100 Ride for Hope. His loving family has kept a *Legacy of Hope* alive in his memory reminding all who care for the children that we do research to honor those who have died.
