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New Hematology/Oncology Chief aiming to make 'outstanding' program even better

*Dr. Cindy Schwartz assures children, families with cancer
'you have come to the best place'*

Cindy Schwartz, MD, MPH is the new section chief of Pediatric Hematology and Oncology at the Medical College of Wisconsin and medical director of Hematology/Oncology at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin. A native of New Jersey, she arrived here from the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, where she served as interim division head and department chair for the Division of Pediatrics and deputy division head for Clinical and Translational Research.

Most of her career has been in the Northeast. After graduating from the Brown University Program in Medicine, she trained in Pediatrics and Pediatric Hematology Oncology at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore and obtained a Masters in Public Health from Harvard. Dr. Schwartz also worked at the University of Rochester (Clinical Director and Interim Section Chief), Johns Hopkins (Associate Director for Clinical Programs in Pediatric Oncology), and at the Hasbro Children's Hospital and Brown University as Division Chief of Pediatric Hematology Oncology.

Although she was not ready to move to Wisconsin in 2005 when Dr. Bruce Camitta brought her here for a visit, she remembered the MACC Fund Center

fondly and is excited to return to Wisconsin.

Dr. Schwartz is an accomplished oncologist with 30 years of academic experience who brings passion and expertise in the areas of Hodgkin lymphoma, osteosarcoma and childhood cancer survivorship. A leader in the Children's Oncology Group, she has served on the COG Executive Committee, Hodgkin Lymphoma Steering Committee, Bone Tumor Steering Committee, just to name a few.

The inaugural chair of the Hodgkin Lymphoma Committee, Dr. Schwartz integrated the Hodgkin disease committees of the two legacy NCI clinical trials groups (POG and CCG) into a cohesive clinical research group that has

changed the paradigm of care in the US, Canada and beyond. She also has led national clinical trials for children with osteosarcoma and is a recognized expert in the long-term consequences of therapy in survivors of childhood cancer, having developed and led the long-term survivorship programs at Johns Hopkins, Brown University and the University of Rochester.

"I am so glad to be here," said Dr. Schwartz, who officially joined the team May 10.

"What attracted me is the amazing clinical care embedded in an outstanding research program. We have wonderful staff and innovative science."

"I have not worked previously in a free-standing children's hospital and I am really looking forward to the environment that is entirely focused on children," she said, noting she is thrilled to come to a program that is in excellent shape, with a great reputation regionally and nationally. "With so many exciting breakthroughs imminent in the field of pediatric oncology, this institution is ready to play a major role in bringing new therapies to children with cancer and blood disorders."

Dr. Schwartz points out that the center has a significant patient population,

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fantastic staff, vibrant research and clinician investigators who know how to translate that science to advance care. "My first goal is to get to know all the team members and better understand what they're doing. They are all so motivated as individuals, but the collaborative environment enables all of us to more rapidly bring new concepts to the forefront."

Dr. Schwartz credits the MACC Fund and the Milwaukee community for playing a big part in her coming here. "The support from the community and the MACC Fund is incredible," said Dr. Schwartz. "Most advances will only happen with external funding. Hospitals are being stretched and reimbursement for patient care is being cut back. Clinical revenues only go so far. Without an organization like the MACC Fund we could not advance our science or bring innovative ideas to our care."

The strong affiliation with Children's Hospital of Wisconsin (CHW) is another big advantage. "Patients and families know they can come here and get the best care and treatment in the country," Dr. Schwartz said. "The clinical care and the research conducted at the MACC Fund Research Center deserves so much credit and recognition. There is more going on here in this middle to large sized program than the community or those outside of Milwaukee know. We want to continue to raise our profile."

Dr. Schwartz will be in the clinic each week and will care for children admitted to the hospital several weeks a year. She notes that it is a privilege to work with children and families in the clinic, trying to bring the most up to date therapy to each child.

"Supporting a family and child through perhaps the greatest challenge in their lives, keeps us going each day," she said. "We do not always have the answers, but we are leaders in designing research programs that improve therapies for the next young child. Only by being an integral part of the innovation at the national level, can we really offer the state of the art care to children in Wisconsin."

While being "visible" on the floor is a very important part of her job, Dr. Schwartz also plans on finding time to do her own research trials. She is optimistic about what lies ahead in the ultimate goal -- curing childhood cancer.

"It is going to change...how we treat cancer," she said. "I think in terms of decades. We have made enormous progress in small increments, but in this next decade there will be big changes. Immune therapies, gene therapy and therapies targeted to the molecular changes that cause cancer or metastasis are being evolved at break-neck speed. The challenge will be having the patients and the funding to do the laboratory work and the clinical trials that will allow us to bring new findings to the patient in need."

Increasing the cure rate and improving treatment comes with a cost, but it's getting tougher to get those precious dollars. "The NIH funding is just not there like it once was," she said. "You can get grants...and we've gotten some recent grants...but it's much more difficult."

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"I've been in this field long enough to know that if you don't have financial support you really can't do much. But thanks to the MACC Fund and the support from the community we are making progress in the treatment and care of children with cancer."

Dr. Schwartz had not planned to be a doctor.

"At age 10, I decided to be physicist and stuck to that idea throughout most of college at Yale," she said. "But in the summer after my junior year, I had a fellowship in a lab at the Weitzman Institute in Israel bombarding carbon atoms into each other. Meanwhile, my friend in another lab was taking antigens off of blood cells to convert blood into 'universal donor' blood that could be used to help anyone.

"That sounded much more useful than what I was doing. So I made the decision to do something more meaningful. I came back and applied for medical school, intending to focus in pediatrics. I thought about other things but I was always leaning toward pediatrics. Nothing is more important than saving the life of a child."

Dr. Schwartz recalls that she chose Pediatric Oncology in the first year of medical school. During a course entitled "Clinical Correlations," a pediatric oncologist introduced a young child with leukemia. "The oncologist knew everything about this child. He knew about her seven siblings, her dog and her cat. This really impressed me... the doctor having all this knowledge about this family. And he knew the emerging science of the disease. That's when I said, 'I want to do this.'"

Dr. Schwartz credits some amazing physicians with her success. Dr. Brigid Leventhal, the first Director of Pediatric Oncology at Hopkins, and Dr. Harvey Cohen, professor and prior Chair of Pediatrics at Stanford University, were her mentors.

"The early years of a career are challenging – long hours, young families and a need to decide exactly what role you want to play in your field," she said. "Having mentors to support you and who have faith in your innate ability makes all the difference."

She now finds herself in the role of teacher/mentor and encouraging the next generation of doctors, researchers and other health care professionals.

"It is fun to watch and help trainees develop their own careers," Dr. Schwartz said. "We have to make sure that their original passion is nurtured despite the challenges. Each trainee needs to find a niche that excites them and ensures they are fully engaged. It doesn't matter if they decide to be a full-time clinician or a full-time laboratory investigator. We need them all. It is the quality of the next generation of doctors, nurse practitioners, and other care providers that will make the difference in the lives of the next generation of children."

When Dr. Schwartz isn't working she enjoys spending time with her husband, Howard. The couple resides in Mequon. They spent a fair share of their summer fixing up their new home. They like to bicycle and downhill ski, and look forward to experiencing more of what Milwaukee has to offer when they aren't trying to catch up with their three grown children who live out east – Jaffa, Adam and Tali. Dr. Schwartz likes that Chicago is close by "if I need a big city fix. But there are lots of things to do here – theater, restaurants, museums, festivals – I have a lot of exploring to do."

What Dr. Schwartz likes best about her job is doing a range of different things related to childhood cancer.

"I provide care in the in-patient setting for those with more acute problems, have the privilege of caring for a child and family throughout the most challenging period of their lives, and the opportunity to design better treatments through translational clinical trials. It's wonderful to be able to work with a full team of dedicated people to provide the best care, the best clinical trials and the best science."

The team is currently investigating how to manipulate a person's immune system to direct it to attack cancer. Other investigators are evaluating genetic therapies that may help correct bleeding disorders or cancers. "This is a transformational time in medicine in general and in pediatric hematology oncology specifically," she said.

"We are not only learning how and why diseases occur, but we are finally getting new tools to treat diseases. The challenge will be to have the funding for laboratory work and clinical trials that will allow us to bring new findings to the patients in need."

Dr. Schwartz sees a bright future with the program she now directs.

"There's so much going on here now and the program offers so much," she said. "The clinical care, the supportive care programs and the outstanding science. There's nothing here that needs to be fixed...but there is always more that we can do to be better. "I'm very excited to be here and looking forward to what lies ahead."

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28th annual TREK 100 raises \$880,000

The 28th Annual TREK 100 continued to be the largest fundraiser in the MACC Fund's 41-year history by raising \$880,000. This amount takes the 28-year NET total to nearly \$15 million.



Trek Bicycle Corporation of Waterloo, Wis., is the nation's largest manufacturer of high end bicycles. The company has been the outstanding sponsor of the TREK 100 since 1990. The ride has been recognized as one of the "Best Rides in the Country" by both *Bicycling* and *Outside* magazine.

On June 3, nearly 2,000 riders supported by great volunteers and ride support cycled 19, 36, 62 (100k) or 100 miles over the beautiful roads abutting abundant farmland in the area around Trek's Waterloo headquarters. Early morning storm clouds and storms gave way to a nice day which ended with a great post-ride celebration.

The riders' day started with a bountiful breakfast served by gracious volunteers mustering everything from fresh pancakes to fruit and juices. Once on their ride, the cyclists were met along the way by enthusiastic rest stop volunteers serving up everything from pizza to brats. The Fall River Rest Stop was run by the members of the MACC Fund Professor's lab from the Medical College of Wisconsin. Dr. Jeff Medin and his team were honored to help the riders who help them do their work.

The riders had a special treat again this year. Brett Favre and Bo Jackson joined the ride for the second year as special guests of Trek's President, John Burke. They added to an already great event helping to make it one of the best Rides in America. The duo joined Century Club members and other guests for a Friday Night "Brett's BBQ" hosted by the Burkes. Brett's teammate and former Badger and local ESPN radio host, Mark Tauscher, added to the Friday night fun and joined in the Ride on Saturday as well.

Trek provided great prizes from bike bags to bicycles for the dedicated riders who solicited pledges for every mile they rode in hopes of finding a cure for childhood cancer. Leading the fundraising effort was longtime MACC Fund friend and rider David Herro with \$26,000, followed by Mike Bown at \$11,480; Jan Rauker at \$11,320; Thomas Klink at \$11,298 and rounding out the Top 5 was Mike Sullivan at \$9,740. Thanks to all who "went the extra mile" raising funds for the kids.

The TREK 100 is a great reunion of MACC Fund friends from around the country and the world. General Corey Carr, who did his own TREK 100 while serving in Iraq on two tours of duty, joined us again this year.



MACC Fund awards \$50,000 grant to Marshfield Clinic

MACC Fund adds first new research partner in 9 years

The MACC Fund awarded a \$50,000 one-year grant in May to support Marshfield Clinic's Children's Oncology Group Clinical Health System's Children's Oncology Group Trials for pediatric hematology and oncology.

"The MACC Fund's reputation across Wisconsin is well regarded thanks to its fundraising efforts for childhood cancer and blood disorders research" said Marshfield Clinic Health System CEO Dr. Susan Turney. "Our researchers and clinicians have made a tremendous difference in the lives of thousands of young cancer patients. This grant will allow Marshfield Clinic Health System to continue seeking new pediatric cancer treatments."

Kevin Steiner, Vice Chair of the MACC Fund's board of directors who presented the grant in a ceremony in the Clinic's Auditorium said "We are excited about the possibility of expanding clinical research support to this part of the state with the hope of advancing the best care for the children of the area as well as the state and nation." Steiner, the President and CEO of West Bend Mutual Insurance Company, grew up in a community near Marshfield.

Marshfield Clinic Children's pediatric cancer specialists treat childhood cancers and blood disorders and staff the region's only pediatric oncology inpatient unit at Marshfield's Children's Hospital. The MACC Fund's board is hopeful this grant will lead to an even greater collaborative clinical effort between Marshfield Clinic Health System and the other beneficiaries of MACC Fund support, namely the Medical College of Wisconsin, Children's Hospital of Wisconsin and University of Wisconsin Carbone Cancer Center.



The graduate of Union Grove High School is a cancer survivor having been diagnosed as an adolescent. He is now a junior playing on the UW-Oshkosh basketball team.

The MACC Fund thanks Mike Huser and Tony Scallon, co-chairmen of the Boys' games, as well as the Girls' co-chairs, Loren Homb and Sam Mathieson, for their dedication and support. In addition, the MACC Fund acknowledges and thanks all of the WBCA coaches and its President, Niki Sutter. 41st Annual Milwaukee Bucks MACC Fund Game

The Milwaukee Bucks 41st annual MACC Fund Game on Oct. 13 at the BMO Harris Bradley Center pitted the Bucks against the Detroit Pistons. The Bucks won the preseason tilt but the real winners were once again the kids who benefit from the outstanding fund-raising efforts of the Bucks. The 41st edition took the cumulative game totals to nearly \$1.5 million.

The Bucks have been at the heart of the MACC Fund since helping start the organization during a Bucks game on Dec. 10, 1976. The MACC Fund is indebted to the ownership group of the Bucks led by Wes Edens, Marc Lasry and Jamie Dinan, along with other local investors, for stepping up to continue this great tradition.

Zachary Johnson, the designer of the 2017 TODAY'S TMJ4 MACC*Star, presented the Honorary Game Ball along with his brother Charlie. Following this, Lulu Sammarco, a 10-year-old who has battled cancer, sang the National Anthem to a point that one could hear a pin drop before a thunderous roar of applause arose as she reached her crescendo before running off the court with a beaming smile from ear to ear.

Coach Jason Kidd used a varied lineup of Bucks young talent in the always entertaining game. An \$880,000 check presentation from the TREK 100 to "the Original Buck," MACC Fund co-founder and Bucks television commentator, Jon McGlocklin, got the crowd excited after the first quarter. The TREK 100 is the MACC Fund's largest annual fundraiser with a total of \$15 million in net proceeds contributed over the past 28 years.

Longtime MACC Fund friend and TODAY'S TMJ4 Meteorologist, Brian Gotter, was the Master of Ceremonies for halftime. Jon McGlocklin accepted a record check from the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) for \$150,000 from its 40th annual high school All-Star Games. The WBCA is the longest standing sponsor of the MACC Fund after the Bucks. Their annual All-Star Games, which are now played in the JustAgame Center in the Wisconsin Dells, have contributed \$2.3 million through its "Gift of Hope through Hoops."


A Mark Fore MACC



MACC Fund Research Symposium

The Pediatric Hematology-Oncology-Bone Marrow Transplant programs at the University of Wisconsin and the Medical College of Wisconsin presented the **2017 MACC Fund Symposium** at the University's Waisman Center on May 23. The Symposium highlighted outcomes research and immune-oncology and 10 brief research presentations consisting of five each from UW and the Medical College of Wisconsin made possible by the MACC Fund. The goal of the Symposium was to provide awareness and foster the potential for collaboration. Judging from the spirited conversations at dinner, the goal was surely met.

Following the dinner, Professor Sue Cohn, MD, Chief, Section of Pediatric Hematology/Oncology Dean for Clinical Research at the University of Chicago and Chair of the MACC Fund's Scientific Advisory Board, presented the keynote speech, "Building an International Neuroblastoma Risk Group (INRG) Data Commons."

The MACC Fund Symposium is an opportunity for scientists and clinicians from two of the MACC Fund's major benefactors to get together in the years that there is not a MACC Fund Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) site visit. These visits are generally scheduled every two to three years. The MACC Fund provides research support to the Medical College of Wisconsin with research conducted in the *MACC Fund Research Center*; to the University of Wisconsin's Carbone Cancer Center with research conducted in the *MACC Fund Childhood Cancer Research Wing* and to the *MACC Fund Center* at Children's Hospital of Wisconsin. The MACC Fund added Marshfield Clinic to its list of beneficiaries this year with a grant to help support Children's Oncology Group (COG) clinical trials. The MACC Fund will distribute \$3,250,000 in research support in 2017 to these four beneficiaries. MACC Fund supported research impacts the treatment of children throughout the state, the nation and the world.


Don Contardi Commitment Award







Donors to the United Way, the State of Wisconsin campaign and the combined federal campaign can designate the MACC Fund to be the beneficiary of their gift.






Women for MACC offers Hope
